From failed relationships, separation from her children, financial struggles, and disabling mental health issues...she has endured it all. Michelle reached a point where the Helping Hands Client Service Specialists felt like she had stalled in her efforts to overcome her situation. In an attempt to help Michelle get out of this rut, Helping Hands required her to enroll in the nutrition and financial class series provided by a partnership among Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Better Living for Texans, and Alliance Bank. Michelle was not at all happy about this requirement being placed on her and she made her feelings known. She begrudgingly agreed and attended the first class. Michelle then returned to complete the 3-class series. She loved all three classes. She later apologized for her attitude in the beginning. Michelle expressed a desire to keep moving forward with her education by enrolling to get her GED. The classroom learning environment provided by Rockwall County Extension Agent, Aimee Sandifeer, encouraged her and motivated her to keep the forward momentum toward selfimprovement.








District 9 Happenings

Colorado, Jackson, Matagorda, and Wharton Counties

The 2019 Western Rice Belt Conference was held in El Campo, TX on January 16th and attended by over 88 people. This year's theme was "Rice the World Over". Each county demonstrated how to make a rice dish common in a country of their choice. Colorado County demonstrated how to make Italian Brown Rice. Jackson County made One Pot Brazilian Chickpeas and Rice. Matagorda County made Uruguayan Rice and Wharton County made a rice dish called German Skillet Dinner. Texas Extension Education Association members from 4 counties helped decorate, find sponsors, cook, and host the event. Each county agent and an assistant helped prepare the dishes for the audience. The guest speaker for the event, Danny Stowers, gave a detailed history of how rice was grown, harvested and sold around the world and in the United States. Over 70 door prizes were given away.



Victoria County

Victoria County hosted their monthly Dinner Tonight at DeTar Hospital on March 14th. Recipes showcased "the luck of the greens" and included new and different ways to incorporate green fruits and veggies into their meals. Fayette County

Multi-District "Food Preservation in the 21st Century" training for county extension agents was held January 16, 2019 in Fayette County. The workshop was hosted by South & South East Regional Program Leaders Jana Osbourn and Erika Bochat; and Austin, Bastrop and Fayette County agents — Michelle Allen, Hillary Long and Sally Garrett. Extension Specialist Jenna Anding taught the sessions which included hot water bath and pressure canning plus dehydration and freezing of produce. Also assisting was Julie Prouse from Extension's Food & Nutrition Department. In the afternoon agents participated in hands-on activities to hot water bath and pressure can produce. Anding also provided agents with suggestions on various ways to offer food preservation classes in their counties. Agents left the training with the "So Easy to Preserve" resource book; a class binder with canning resources, tips and recipes; and 2 canned products.

Matter of Balance Series Offered:

After being contacted by the City of La Grange's Recreational Center about offering "A Matter of Balance" (AMoB) classes, the 8-session series was set for the month of February. A full class of 13 registrants was started on February and agent Sally Garrett and program assistant Jenifer Boening conducted classes every Tuesday and Thursday for 4 weeks. Local Physical Therapist, Debra Hall, attended the 6th class to offer fall prevention tips and suggestions for additional exercises that participants could easily replicate at home. A celebration was held at the final class and certificates presented to class members. One member, who has Parkinson's, stated she had seen a marked improvement with the AMoB exercises, and she would be continuing with them. Another member said that with the exercises his arthritis and movement in his hands had also improved.
